SEMIANNUAL PROGRESS REPORT

October 2020 - March 2021 | Kenya

SUMMARY

The Kenya Big Dream project continues to help children experience life in all its fullness, through eradicating female genital mutilation/ cutting (FGM/C) and child marriage in Baringo and West Pokot.

Notably, elders and community members initiated a national declaration and public cursing against FGM/C and child marriage. "This is a day like no other," stated a Pokot elder, "FGM/C has been the norm after which girls as young as nine years are subjected to marriage. As Pokot Elders, we have seen the need to stop this because this is hurting our children."

When families experience increased incomes, there is less pressure on young girls to marry in exchange for a bride price. Given this reality, World Vision completed a value chain assessment to identify high-value crops that can be grown to increase family income. After identification, farmers will be trained in technical skills and equipped to access markets with the most desirable goods.


In addition to the core activities listed below, other achievements include:

- 2,022 children empowered with knowledge and key life skills to protect and prepare them for the challenges of life.
- 300 children and 200 parents participated in a spiritual nurture of children (SNC) training, empowering them to express and experience the love of God.
- 42 traditional FGM/C circumcisers, including parents, abandoned their tools of mutilation and embraced change, including their livelihoods.

PROGRESS ON CORE ACTIVITIES




CHALLENGES AND LESSONS LEARNED

Insecurity due to intercommunal violence in Baringo county, and the resulting travel restrictions imposed by the government, was a challenge for project implementation. This security situation interrupted school, community, and agricultural activities, and will be taken into consideration for future plans.

School interruptions due to COVID-19 also impacted activities. Due to limited time in the school year, teachers focused strictly on academics and did not have time to include the planned child protection activities. However, 304 children—mostly girls—who did not report back in the first week of school reopening, were reached through intensive go-back-to-school campaigns, in partnership with the government.

PLANS FOR THE NEXT SIX MONTHS

The focus for the second half of FY21 involves concluding the design for Phase 2 of the project, which will start in FY22 and include lauching the project in the Samburu region.

Simultaneously, World Vision will continue Phase 1 of the project, including supporting children to engage leaders in child protection forums and facilitating sessions on Empowered Worldview. We will also 1) train households in entrepreneurship and business development, 2) train village agents to support savings groups, 3) support children and families in the spiritual nurture of children, and, 4) promote child protection information management at all levels.
