

# **SEMIANNUAL PROGRESS REPORT**

October 2021 – March 2022 | Rwanda

### **SUMMARY**

**ECONOMIC** EMPOWERMENT

THRIVE changes lives. We praise God and thank our donors for the more than 60,000 lives touched by Rwanda THRIVE so far—lives like Jean's, a farmer (pictured at right) who doubled his corn harvest after taking agricultural training through THRIVE (Transforming Household Resilience in Vulnerable Environments). Or Baptiste and his wife Claudine, who used to worry about finances before they took a loan to start a successful pig farm. With their profits, they've installed running water in their home. Or ask Marcel, who grew his poultry business from 50 to 400 hens. "THRIVE opened my eyes to see that I can benefit from available opportunities to improve my livelihoods," Marcel says.

Highlights from Rwanda THRIVE in the first half of FY22 include:

#### Savings for Transformation groups

In these groups, members save together and provide small loans to each other. In FY22, 8,468 group members accessed \$238,267 of these loans to pay school fees and buy livestock. In addition, VisionFund (World Vision's microfinance institution) connected groups with \$47,719 in additional loans to further invest in their businesses. Farmers have grown more confident in taking loans after seeing the success of their peers.

#### Profits from pig farming

This period, THRIVE worked with local partners to provide boars to farmers to crossbreed their herds, improving meat quality and quantity. **As a result of training and wise investments, profits from pig farming, corn, and horticulture have more than doubled—from \$297,620 in the first quarter of the year to \$644,142 in the second quarter.** To protect these gains, THRIVE is helping farmers adopt recently introduced government livestock insurance.



"It is better to learn to fish than to be given fish," says Jean Damascene, pictured with his family. Jean joined THRIVE in 2017 and has watched his life transform. "My children get nutritious meals and all the required scholastic materials. ... I pay health insurance on time for the whole family and clothes are no longer an issue," he says.

### **PLANNING FOR SUSTAINABILITY**

As THRIVE farmers experience greater success, the project team is focusing on increasing community ownership and sustainability so that individual success becomes generational change. Efforts are informed in part by the third-party midterm evaluation completed in FY21. Areas of greatest focus include:

- **Partnership with local government:** Partnership with national and district governments continues to yield positive results. Currently, THRIVE participants and districts are working together to construct new produce selling points, finalize an agreement for managing three new hillside irrigation systems (expected to be in use by summer 2022), and obtain legal recognition for producer groups (farmers who work together to buy and sell at scale) as cooperatives so they can have greater market access (expected spring of 2022).
- **Data gathering and monitoring:** In FY22, THRIVE adopted a digital data monitoring system called Last Mile Mobile Solutions (LMMS) that will increase data security and make it easier for staff to track participant progress over time.
- Biblical Empowered Worldview (BEWV): This foundational training empowers participants to recognize their God-given worth, and, according to an independent study, move from dependence to active agency. To ensure these messages are lasting, community volunteers began leading BEWV refresher trainings in February 2022. So far in FY22, more than 10,000 people have received refresher training, and staff are using the LMMS data tool to identify who still needs this training.
