SUMMARY

ECONOMIC EMPOWERMENT

As of March, **we officially surpassed our goal to reach 90,000 people in Zambia** with economic empowerment activities through Transforming Household Resilience in Vulnerable Environments (THRIVE). Your prayers and support helped make this achievement possible.

Families participating in Zambia THRIVE report that they now have enough food to eat, have made improvements to their homes, and are able to send their children to primary school and even pay for higher education—a rare scenario in the past. Most importantly, we have seen positive changes in how people view themselves and their environment, thanks to Biblical Empowered Worldview training. During the first half of fiscal year 2022, the project:

 Trained 11,017 farmers, including 5,670 women (like Hilda, at right), in the Farming God's Way methodology, which teaches conservation techniques such as mulching, crop rotation, and using compost manure

- Engaged 1,464 farmers to plant
 4,063,469 shade trees to conserve
 land, improve soil fertility, and
 increase crop production
- Provided nearly \$265,000 in loans to 1,761 clients through VisionFund, World Vision's network of microfinance institutions
- Established four farmer cooperatives and trained 350 farmers in honey production, adding a new source of income to their households
- Added 80 new Savings for Transformation groups, bringing the total to 795 since the project began



Hilda Lungu, a farmer in the Katete area program, breeds chickens, goats, and ducks, and grows crops in her garden. "World Vision came and taught us the advantages of conservation farming. At first, I doubted it, but once I [tried it], I harvested more than I expected. Since then, I have vowed to never stop doing it because I have seen its results and goodness," Hilda says.

KEY LEARNINGS

Our staff recently completed a Gender Equality and Social Inclusion (GESI) evaluation, and will be integrating the results with our activities for the remainder of the project. World Vision's THRIVE projects have been pioneers in performing GESI assessments, which give us critical insight into the vital roles that women, youth, persons with disabilities, and other vulnerable populations play in driving sustainable change. By integrating what we learn from evaluations into our projects, we increase community inclusion and the sustainability of our outcomes.

The parable of the lost sheep in Matthew 18 reminds us that God cares about all of His children, including those who may traditionally be overlooked. Using GESI principles helps ensure we reach as many people as possible with the tools to overcome poverty.

94,981 people have benefited from economic empowerment activities since the project began in FY17, accomplishing a completion rate of 106%.

PLANS FOR THE NEXT SIX MONTHS

During the second half of FY22, the project will:

- Train farmers in post-harvest technologies, such as improved storage, to increase the quality and shelf life of products
- Partner with Community Markets for Conservation to support producer groups with improved market awareness and access, linking them with buyers
- Continue working with communities to ensure that watersheds are identified, protected, and sustainably managed for improved crop production

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Through THRIVE, Allan Phiri (pictured above in his grocery shop) joined a Savings for Transformation group and received financial literacy and business skills training, enabling him to feed his children and pay for their schooling. A recent external study of THRIVE in Tanzania revealed gamechanging results for participants, including a dramatic increase in incomes, as well as improved food security, access to financial services, gender equality, resilience, and child well-being.
