



ANNUAL PROGRESS REPORT

October 2022-September 2023 | Kenya

SUMMARY

We are thrilled to share that our Kenya Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH) team reached 188,102 people with access to clean water in FY23, surpassing their annual goal and accomplishing one of World Vision's largest WASH achievements globally.

We also made progress providing a reliable, clean water supply in health clinics, which will improve patient care and reduce infections for patients and staff. In FY23, we installed 51 water taps (142% of our annual target) at 22 healthcare facilities and repaired another 17 taps.

Additional highlights from FY23 include:

The Sesame Workshop's WASH
 UP! program was launched
 in 100 schools. Some 80% of
 children in WASH UP! schools,
 versus only 23% in other schools,
 demonstrated an understanding

of the link between waste disposal and disease. Also, we are seeing WASH UP! students share these lessons at home, evidenced by more handwashing stations being built in their households.

- 499 faith leaders were trained to promote healthy hygiene behaviors in their communities.
- More than 31,000 acres were covered by watershed management activities to help replenish groundwater.
 - World Vision Kenya hosted the Global WASH Forum in Malindi, with donors, partners, and WASH experts—the first global gathering since 2020. Our WASH team showcased its expertise in technologies like mWater (a mobile platform) and geographic information system mapping, as well as universal coverage, market-based sanitation, and governance and finance.



Women in the village of Rumate in the Isiolo Oldonyiro AP carry water home from a newly constructed water point. Having access to clean water within a 10-minute walk from home not only reduces disease in the community, it frees up precious time these women can use to spend time with their families or pursue economic opportunities.



CHALLENGES AND KEY LEARNINGS

Unpredictable weather patterns in Kenya continue to create problems. After years of little rain, a predicted El Niño threatened to bring flooding, which meant we needed to finish construction early in the year, before roads became impassable. The WASH team also decided to integrate more climate resilient programming into work plans.

The Kenya staff found that the Nurturing Care Group (NCG) model is better at eliminating open defecation than Community-Led Total Sanitation (CLTS), as mothers who play lead roles in the NCGs are more effective in passing on sanitation messages in a personal, face-to-face approach. We plan to expand this approach to more areas in the future.

PROGRESS TOWARD FIVE-YEAR BUSINESS PLAN



Goal

937,275 people gain access to clean
drinking water from FY21 through FY25.

Actual

555,590 people gained access to clean drinking water since October 2020, achieving 59% of our target.

PLANS FOR THE NEXT SIX MONTHS

In the first six months of FY24, we plan to:

- Begin working on large water systems on the Athi river. These projects will
 require more time and financial investment than any previous system the
 Kenya team has built. Construction is expected to finish by early FY25.
- Continue work on our Strong Women Strong World project, which integrates WASH and economic empowerment. We will start up business centers in these areas and work with VisionFund (World Vision's microfinance subsidiary) to improve access to capital for WASH products and female-headed businesses.

In the past, children like Sharon, 13, frequently missed school due to waterborne illnesses. Families relied on often contaminated shallow wells, streams, and ponds for their water. That all changed when World Vision constructed a new water system, providing clean water to the village of Barbachun in Kenya's Bartabwa AP. Latrines and handwashing facilities also were built at the school, and students and community members all learned about the importance of good hygiene practices.
