



ANNUAL PROGRESS REPORT

October 2022–September 2023 | Rwanda

SUMMARY

We are thrilled to share that we have exceeded the commitment we made to our donors, partners, and the government of Rwanda in 2018 to bring clean water to 1 million people. In fact, we reached 1,181,958 people, including an impressive 270,084 people in FY23 (128% of target)!

Clean water is now plentiful, everywhere World Vision works in Rwanda. And over the course of this five-year effort, we have seen the number of people gaining access to clean water increase from an average of 50,000 a year to more than 200,000 each year.

In May, World Vision president and CEO Edgar Sandoval Sr. traveled to Rwanda to attend a ceremony celebrating this ambitious achievement. He also met with Rwandan Prime Minister Édouard Ngirente to discuss the impact of our Finish the Job campaign. Learn more

Following are a few highlights from our work in FY23:

- Our team signed memorandums of understanding with 18 district governments for water projects, which resulted in co-investments for water system construction totaling \$4,898,781.
- A Food for Education grant contributed to a huge increase in the formation of school WASH clubs, with 323 established against an FY23 target of just 23.
- A flourishing partnership with Sesame Workshop and the government led to training students in 266 schools on good hygiene practices through the WASH UP! program.


^{**}The hygiene target was set unrealistically high during the COVID-19 response due to the heightened need for handwashing, skewing the actual results for FY23.

CHALLENGES AND KEY LEARNINGS

Private companies charged with maintaining water tanks in Rwanda were not properly cleaning the tanks and chlorinating the water, increasing the likelihood of contamination. The government is taking over managing all water points, which should lead to improved water quality at the tap.

In addition, a new government policy requiring all children to attend school raised enrollment rates in the schools where we work. Moving forward, our WASH team will need to revise infrastructure plans to build more taps for drinking water, latrines, and handwashing facilities at these schools.

PROGRESS TOWARD FINISHING THE JOB



Goal

1 million people gain access to clean drinking water from FY19 through FY23.

Actual

1,181,958 people gained access to clean drinking water since October 2018, achieving 118% of our target.



While we have reached a major milestone, our work in Rwanda isn't done. World Vision will continue to implement water projects in newly opened area programs, and provide the support necessary to ensure the infrastructure we built is sustainable. In addition, we have not yet hit 90% access to sanitation and hygiene in our operation areas, so we will continue to provide behavior change activities and support households to improve their hygienic environments.

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

FINISH THE JOB RWANDA

This map shows World Vision program sites in Rwanda districts (similar to counties in the U.S.) where we worked in FY19 to FY23, and their water point coverage rates.



^{*}Endline evaluations were done in this sector while final infrastructure works were being completed. The final results showed less than 90% of households with access to water within 30 minutes. However, now that the work is completed, we are repeating the data collection and we expect the evaluation to show over 90% access.
