



# SEMIANNUAL PROGRESS REPORT

October 2023-March 2024 | Zambia

#### **SUMMARY**

World Vision remains committed to reaching our goal of providing clean water to everyone, everywhere we work in Zambia. After careful review of the current gaps in water coverage in our program areas, we are increasing our target to reach 1 million people by 2026. We celebrate *finishing the job* in four area programs so far this year (Kawaza, Manyinga, Mudanyama, and Mufumbwe), reaching 90% of the populations with clean water.

Over the past six months, we reached 69,400 people with clean water, and we enhanced sanitation and hygiene for countless others. Our efforts have been amplified by innovative solutions and strong partnerships, ensuring sustainable progress.

#### Water delivery systems strengthened

We improved water delivery through the installation of 198 handpumps and 54 piped-water systems with 1,133 taps. Seventeen clinics and 39 schools gained access to reliable water sources, improving services for expectant mothers and enhancing the education of 16,888 students.

### Communities achieve ODF status

The program enabled 422 communities to achieve Open Defecation Free status by building 13,643 toilets. This was the result of a new sanitation marketing model introduced last year to help address the challenge of latrines collapsing during heavy rainfall.

### **Expanding Sesame WASH UP!**

The Sesame WASH UP! program has continued to expand, thanks to our partnership with the Ministry of Education. This collaboration ensures the sustainability of the program, with schools now budgeting for WASH UP! activities. Following the recent cholera outbreak, the Ministry of Education committed to rolling out the initiative to all grades.


#### **CHALLENGES AND ADAPTATIONS**

The ongoing challenge with new government standards requiring flush toilets continues to affect our ability to achieve sanitation targets for school and healthcare facilities. This has significantly increased costs, exceeding the project's budget through 2025. As a result, we will not meet our targets for institutional toilets this year. World Vision will collaborate with the government and local partners to supplement our work.

A cholera outbreak in Zambia from October 2023 to early 2024 resulted in nearly 20,000 infections and 700 deaths. In response, World Vision monitored water quality at 97 water points and supplied 370,000 gallons of safe water to approximately 93,000 people in Kanyama, a cholera hotspot in Lusaka.

#### PROGRESS TOWARD FINISHING THE JOB

We originally aimed to reach 800,000 people by 2025, but after analyzing the need, we have increased our target to reach 1 million people by 2026. Thank you for your partnership in this life-giving effort. Together, we will finish the job!




Goal

**1 million people** gain access to clean drinking water from FY21 through FY26.

Actual\*

**666,113 people** gained access to clean drinking water since October 2020, including 69,400 during the first half of FY24, achieving 67% of our target.



#### PLANS FOR THE NEXT SIX MONTHS

Work in the second half of FY24 will include:

- Constructing two small electrical grids in Chikwa, Muchinga Province:
   Funded by a private grant, these micro-grids will mark the beginning of World Vision's first-ever energy project in Zambia and provide electricity to two communities, including healthcare facilities and schools.
- Building new infrastructure during the dry season: With the end of the rainy season, we are gearing up to implement the majority of construction activities for the year. Plans include installing an additional 120 piped-water systems and 285 handpumps.



Clean water enables families to wash their hands and clean their dishes, greatly enhancing hygiene and helping to reduce the incidence of waterborne diseases such as cholera.



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






## **FINISH THE JOB ZAMBIA**
