Dear friend of World Vision,

In my visits to some of the world's toughest places, I've learned that no matter how severe the crisis or extreme the poverty, there's always more than meets the eye—something that takes eyes of faith to see.

Initially my senses tend to be overwhelmed with the pain that's in plain sight. This was my experience in 2024 when I traveled to Adré, a town in Chad near the border with Sudan. I encountered a throng of people, most of them women and children, who had fled the violence in Sudan—violence that forcibly displaced 14 million people in just over a year. Hungry, thirsty, and exhausted, these refugees were arriving to an unforgiving landscape without sustainable access to food and shelter. All I saw in their faces was despair.

It's easy to feel hopeless at the sight of suffering. But in these moments, I've found that God prompts me to change my perspective and see what He sees. He has not forgotten these children and families. In Adré, He showed me how He was bringing helpers to their aid—compassionate World Vision staff who faithfully serve, equipped with resources from generous people like you.

Seeing that powerful combination of compassion and generosity gives me hope.

I pray this annual impact report will do the same for you, helping you to see an even fuller picture of how God is working through your faithfulness. In 2024, you came alongside World Vision's staff

around the world, making hope tangible for children and families, even in the hardest circumstances.

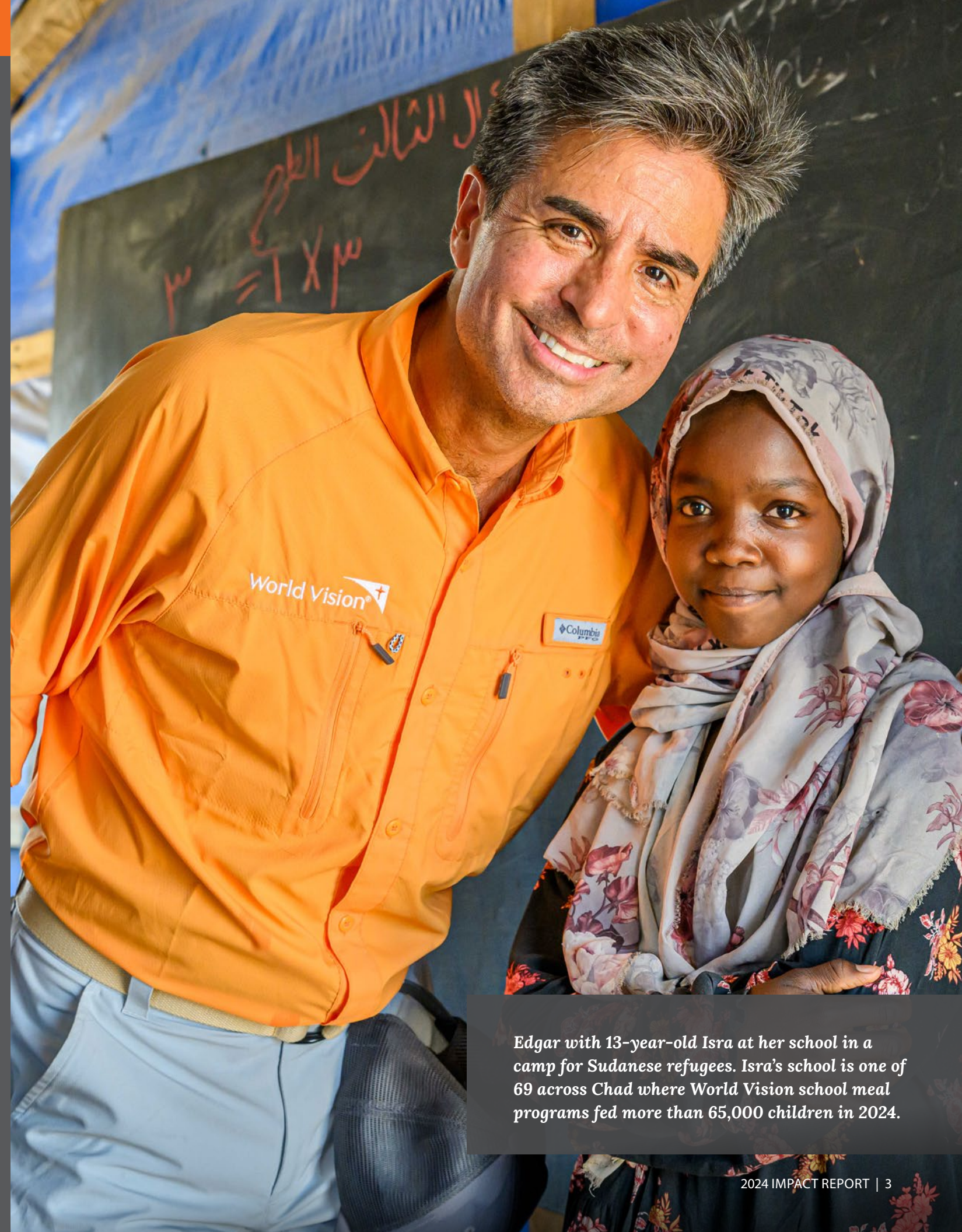

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Sudan crisis response

Ongoing conflict in Sudan has triggered the worst child displacement crisis in the world—and the largest hunger crisis as well. More than half of Sudan’s population faced crisis levels of food insecurity in 2024, and by the end of the year over 14 million people had fled their homes to escape danger. “The suffering and desperation are at a massive scale, yet this is a crisis you hear almost nothing about,” says World Vision president Edgar Sandoval Sr., who witnessed it firsthand in May when a team of World Vision’s U.S. staff visited refugee families at the Sudan–Chad border. The trip, and the stories that came out of it, galvanized World Vision’s U.S. office to launch an awareness and fundraising campaign, which in fiscal year 2024 alone generated 92.1 million media impressions, strong social media engagement, and nearly \$5.4 million in support of the children and families caught in this largely forgotten disaster.

Between the start of World Vision’s response in 2023 and the end of our 2024 fiscal year, we’d reached **more than 2.8 million people** in the region with emergency assistance, including food, child protection programs, health services, clean water and sanitation solutions, and more. The faithful generosity of our donors and partners in the U.S. and around the world has fueled this lifesaving work and, by God’s grace, will help carry it forward.

In June 2023, Tahani fled her village in Sudan on foot with her twin boys, Adam and Adeeb, seeking safety across the Chad border. But by May 2024, the 21-month-old boys were severely malnourished and had been referred to a nutrition center for treatment. Adam (shown above) was particularly vulnerable, weighing only 13 pounds. Thankfully, with the care they received, both boys were well on their way to recovery within just a few months. Catalyzed by their story and others, World Vision donors gave generously to establish electricity and solar power for the clinic, as well as access to clean water for the clinic and other facilities—ensuring more families get the resources they need.

When we see people in need through the eyes of Jesus, we’re compelled to respond with the love He modeled ... love that has the power to heal and restore.

World Vision works in **40 of the 60 countries classified by global experts as “fragile,”** and in 12 of the 15 classified as “extremely fragile.”

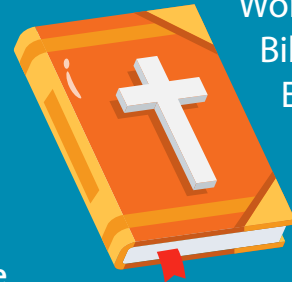


Life-changing programs around the world

HONDURAS | Born in a remote region of Honduras, Yessica (pictured below left) worked a mining job starting at age 10 to afford her education. Money was always scarce, and she struggled with a lack of self-esteem. Then in 2017, World Vision came to her community, offering youth a field school in agricultural techniques—and a training called Biblical Empowered Worldview that transformed Yessica’s view of herself and the potential God had created in her. Today she’s a successful coffee farmer who exudes strength—earning a stable income that surpasses the national average, and teaching other aspiring local farmers. She’s even built a home for the grandmother who always believed in her.

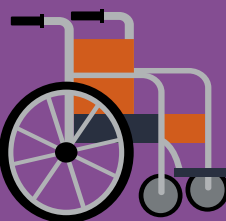

U.S. disaster relief

In the fall of 2024, two powerful storms—Hurricanes Helene and Milton—made landfall in the eastern United States, devastating communities across Florida, Georgia, and the Carolinas. World Vision responded immediately, partnering with local churches to distribute essentials like water, generators, bedding, diapers, tools, and more. By mid-October, we had delivered 25 truckloads of relief supplies with help from our generous donors and partners—and we’re still in these communities, offering support through our church and community partners and working alongside families as they rebuild their lives.*

Last year, 57 million people participated in programs funded by World Vision U.S. supporters. In communities around the world, we've seen the hope and healing God brings about through the faithfulness of our donors, partners, and staff. Here's an overview of our impact together in 2024.

Emergency response*

- Responded to **84 emergencies and disasters in 65 countries** worldwide
- Reached **35.2 million disaster survivors, refugees, and displaced people** with humanitarian assistance, including **18.9 million children**

Food

- Used **\$208.4 million in food grants**, including **220,550 metric tons of food supplies**, to help nourish children and families in 18 countries
- Continued to serve as the **largest implementing partner** of the World Food Programme*

*Over the last 15 years, 88% of the severely malnourished children we treated made a full recovery.**

Water, sanitation, and hygiene*

- Equipped **3.1 million people** with safer, more accessible water, **2.4 million people** with household sanitation, and **2.8 million people** with household handwashing facilities
- Constructed or repaired **98,152 wells and water points** in communities, schools, and health centers, and constructed **420,945 household sanitation facilities**

Since 2011, together we've reached 37.5 million people with lasting access to clean water. World Vision is reaching one new person with clean water every 10 seconds, and one new person with a handwashing facility as well.

Economic empowerment

- Reached **2.4 million people** with tools to lift themselves out of extreme poverty
- Equipped **374,119 people** for improved financial resilience through membership in World Vision-supported savings groups

*Through World Vision, every 60 seconds a family gets the tools to overcome poverty.**



Child protection

- Trained **200,770 children and youth** to protect themselves and others from harm
- Mobilized **393,467 parents and caregivers** to nurture children and advocate for their protection

Education

- Reached **nearly 1.3 million children** through education programs in 10 countries





Health

- Upgraded **387 healthcare facilities** with access to clean water*
- Reached **25.9 million people in 29 countries** with disease prevention training, treatment, and support

Faith and development†

- Equipped **87,689 Christian pastors and church leaders** to support holistic child well-being
- Reached **nearly 7.8 million people**, including nearly 2.3 million children and youth, with discipleship, spiritual nurture, and faith-based programs
- Made **87,070 Bibles** available to children and families worldwide

Help at home

- Served **3.4 million children and adults** in need through our work in the U.S., including over **50,000 people** reached through disaster response

Individuals

In fiscal year 2024, 713,508 individual donors and 11,797 organizational donors in the U.S. partnered with World Vision to equip kids and families around the world to overcome poverty.

Sponsors

- **859,000 children** benefited from child sponsorship programs supported by World Vision donors in the U.S.
- Globally, World Vision sponsors helped equip **2.9 million children** for brighter futures through our child sponsorship program.

Major donor partners

- **11,100 donor partners**—including individuals, foundations, organizations, and businesses—gave donations totaling **\$315 million**, with total gifts averaging \$28,300 per donor.

Other donors

- **5,764 members of Team World Vision** trained for half marathons, marathons, and triathlons, raising funds to support access to clean water in communities around the world.
- Over 22,400 individuals participated in World Vision's Global 6K for Water®, helping more than **32,000 people gain access to clean water** by raising \$1.65 million.

- 30 Hour Famine participants raised \$452,871 to **help feed and care for 945 children for a year.**
- **More than 30,500 monthly givers** faithfully donated to empower families and communities in need to leave poverty behind.

Corporations

In fiscal year 2024, 393 corporate partners offered financial support, product donations, and the power of their brands to support World Vision's work, contributing:

- **\$7.6 million in cash gifts**, including \$4.3 million in workplace matching gifts.
- **93,540 pallets** of donated products valued at \$213.8 million, benefiting millions of people in 30 countries (including \$160.9 million worth in the U.S. alone).

Churches

Our valued church partners in the U.S. share God's love in tangible ways with children and families in need here at home and around the world. In 2024:

- **3,030 U.S. churches** helped meet global needs by financially supporting World Vision programs.
- **2,141 U.S. church partners** supported people affected by poverty and disasters here at home.



U.S. government and other agencies

Public grants help make it possible for World Vision to serve the most vulnerable people in parts of the world where it's hardest to be a child. We rigorously steward these resources to ensure the most effective results. In 2024:

- The U.S. government granted **\$357 million in food, non-food commodities, and cash** through World Vision.
- Other agencies granted **\$279 million in food, non-food commodities, and cash** through World Vision.
- World Vision served as the **ninth largest** implementing partner of USAID.

Advocates

In 2024, World Vision Advocates put their faith into action by speaking up on behalf of vulnerable children and encouraging leaders to support policies that help create lasting change.

- 291 advocates representing 40 states engaged members of Congress with **432 in-person meetings** and other relational high-impact engagements.
- More than 5,000 advocates sent **44,218 messages** to members of Congress in support of funding and legislation to protect children from violence and exploitation, support disease prevention efforts, treat and prevent malnutrition, and more.

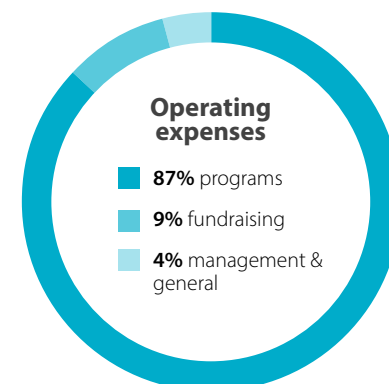
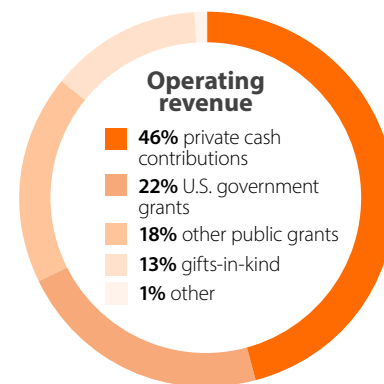

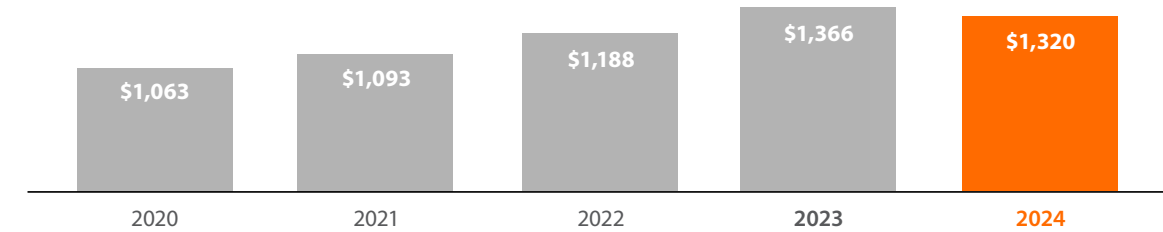

Operating expenses (in millions)

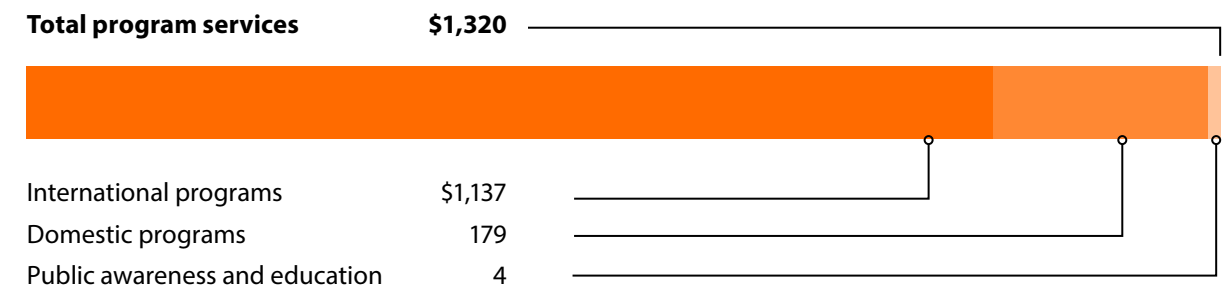

Spending on programs benefiting children and their communities surpassed \$1.3 billion for the second year in a row, following seven consecutive years of growth.

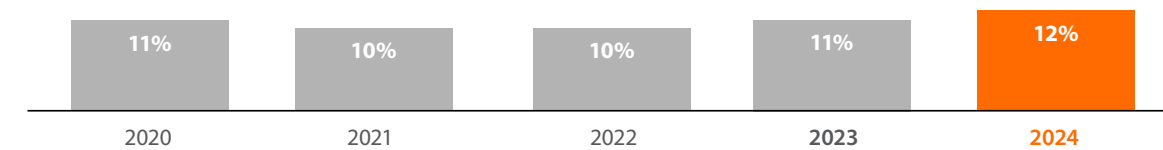


Program services (in millions)



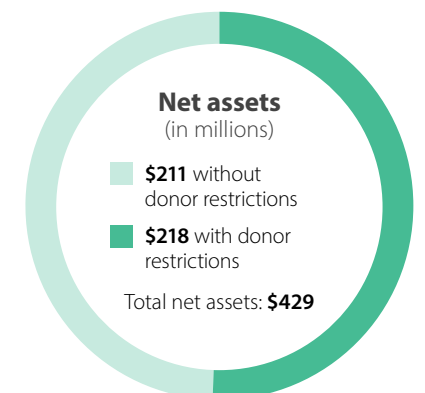
Overhead rate (% of operating revenue) remains low
